### President's Letter

I am pleased to be delivering the 2023 President's report for the Bowen Street Community Centre. It has been a year of stability and normalcy with all activities returning to pre-covid operations. It has been pleasing to see the Centre in full swing this year with childcare, playgroup and classes. Childcare continues to be a success and we are pleased to be at capacity with a waiting list for 2024; this result is a testament to the staff and educators at Bowen Street. Playgroups and classes are an area we continue to monitor and adapt to the needs of the community. Community feedback collected from our annual survey will drive required changes to ensure we continue to provide relevant and engaging services to our community.

There has been much focus in 2023 on physical improvements at the centre. These have included updates to the playground space, a lovely new front garden for the Toorak building, interior improvements to the Toorak building which have enhanced the usability of available space considerably. Mary has done a great job of leading all planned and unplanned works, liaising with Council as needed to make these improvements possible.

Governance has been another area of focus for the Centre and Committee of Management in 2023. ## Manager's Letter

This is to be my twenty-first AGM at Bowen Street and my twentieth Manager's letter and report.

This year Bowen Street Community Centre celebrates 41 years of providing community connection programs to the City of Boroondara.

2023 saw the completion of the back playground space and the completion of a beautiful new garden in front of the Toorak building. Diane Beddison from Beddison Garden Designs generously donated her time and the CAD drawings for design and plant selection. The City of Boroondara completed the project.

We were hoping to have a community opening but could not due to major structural issues in the garage adjacent to the Toorak building, requiring demolition. The nearby wall is also unstable, so a planned mural (painted by a community artist) has been put on hold. We will hope to have a mural and garden opening celebration.

City of Boroondara also installed a door between our multipurpose room and the art studio in the Toorak building, providing an opportunity for the programming of classes, workshops or groups running concurrently. This has opened opportunities to expand our programs.

We deeply appreciate our childcare educators and volunteers, who work together as a great team and provide a wonderful program of high-quality childcare to local families. We welcomed Sara Pinto, Cora Wen, and Ally Yong to our educator team, and farewelled Audette Domaski and Yuko So-Stavretus. Carla Sharp resigned as a permanent educator but remained on as a casual educator.

Playgroups have resumed with parents from Bowen Street, Glen Iris, Camberwell, and East Hawthorn. The return to groups remains slow with new groups often not continuing past 10 weeks, as many primary carers return to the workforce.

The grandparents' playgroup continues to flourish and this year community artist and grandmother Jennifer Garrard spent many weeks with the group painting a grandparents' mural for the refurbished backyard space. Every child contributed with the painting, including where they would like to appear on the painting and what they would be wearing. Even Irish Grandpa Nigel makes an appearance as a leprechaun. Enjoy the result on the cover of this report!

Once again, I wish to thank the wonderful office team—Beth Ellis, Zsuzsanna Kollar, Carmel Mugavin, and Dianne Webster—for their continued support. The reception is the first connection for centre users and new community members and each of you offers a warm welcome and helpful assistance to everyone who walks through our doors. I hope you are

all proud of what you do and how vital your work is in keeping the local Bowen Street Community relevant, connected, and a welcoming place to attend.

A big thank you to the Committee of Management for their contribution during the year. A special acknowledgement to departing members Alice Dunn and Sylvia Pump.

For the other committee members, it's wonderful that you are all staying on for another term providing our organisation with some stability and succession. Your support has once again been invaluable throughout the year. To the new Committee members—welcome!

We look forward to your new ideas and we will work together to support your local community and make BSCC a great place in 2024.

#### City of Boroondara

We continue to sit under Community Planning and Development.

This year saw the launch of the Neighbourhood House Framework, developed in consultation with the Boroondara neighbourhood houses. It builds on our existing relationship and is predicated on a mutual obligation to work in partnership to deliver community programs and services that are responsive, inclusive and facilitate social connections and belonging.

Developed under the Boroondara Community Plan 2021-2031, the Framework outlines Council's commitment to a strategic and coordinated approach to supporting and promoting neighbourhood houses as key hubs for community learning, community participation, development, and capacity building. A key element of the Framework is the Action Plan, to help neighbourhood houses support the objectives in the BCP.

#### **Associations Incorporation Reform Regulations 2023**

In November 2023, the proposed regulations will replace the Associations Incorporation Reform Regulations 2012. The proposed regulations make several regulatory scheme changes, including:

- alternative tiers and revenue thresholds for financial reporting
- an increased value for voluntary cancellation of an incorporation association
- updated model rules, allowing flexible technology use to improve administration
- new disciplinary appeal processes, ensuring higher dispute resolution standards.

#### Review of the 2016 collective workplace agreement for Neighbourhood Houses Victoria

The following principles have been adopted by Jobs Australia after consultation with members for negotiations for a new multi-employer agreement for Neighbourhood Houses in Victoria 2023.

- 1. The new agreement must be affordable and sustainable to all Neighbourhood Houses in Victoria. The wage increases arising from this agreement must be fully funded by the Victorian Government. Wages increases must not be at the expense of Neighbourhood Houses in Victoria by:
  - a. cutting services, or programs to the community
  - b. reducing days or hours of operation, for services or programs to the community
  - c. reduction in days and/or hours of paid work for employees
  - d. redundancies of employees
  - e. requirement to increase revenue through increased fees and/or charges for services or programs to the community.
  - f. Jobs Australia call upon the Victorian Government to fully fund all wages and costs that arise from this new agreement by increasing funding through indexation.
- 2. The new agreement must address the difficulty in interpreting and applying clauses in found previous agreements by simplifying and clarifying problematic clauses by using clear and plain language that is easier to interpret and apply.
- 3. The new agreement must address clauses that cause an unfunded liability and cost burden, e.g., accident make-up pay (39 weeks), Paid Parental Leave, additional Personal Leave above the award or NES, additional Long Service Leave, etc.
- 4. The new agreement must not include new clauses that add or cause additional an unfunded liability and cost burden to Neighbourhood Houses.
- 5. The new agreement must reflect the National Employment Standards (NES) and the underpinning Award terms and conditions.

#### **Department of Families, Fairness and Housing**

Bowen Street Community Centre will receive an additional 5.35% increase on their current funding agreement. Importantly, funding agreements will be indexed annually using an agreed formula of 80% of Fair Work Commission National Wage Case increase plus 20% CPI. This means future indexation will be tied to cost increases, a much more sustainable arrangement. This also included ongoing funding for 4 years.

- Cooking: Dumplings, South American cooking, Christmas cooking
- General interest: Pathway to employment

## **Childcare Report**

Bowen Street Community Centre's child care program has once again experienced a year of great success. The program remains in high demand, with all sessions fully booked and waitlists in place. The team has worked diligently to maintain a safe and nurturing environment for the children in our care.

This year, we bid farewell to Audette, our dedicated childcare coordinator, who stayed on this year to update childcare policies and assist with compliance updates. Additionally, we extend our best wishes to Yuko, who has transitioned to a role in a kindergarten setting. Their presence will be greatly missed by educators, staff, and families.

In the interest of safety and fostering a sense of security, we have continued collecting children at the front door, with new parents having the option to drop off inside until they feel comfortable. Afternoon pickups are conducted inside the rooms. This approach aims to maintain open lines of communication and connection between parents and staff.

We have had an upgrade to our 5hr room yard – thank you to the council for providing this. We have a riverbed and a new bridge for our pirate ship!

This year, three students joined us for training, and we have subsequently hired them for casual positions as relief staff members. Remarkably, we have not required the services of agency staff throughout the year.

We are pleased to welcome Anne and Hazel as permanent staff members for the 3-hour room. Both previously served as relief educators and have proven to be valuable additions to our team. We have had several volunteers this year, 3 of which are now or planning to study Early Childhood Education.

Both rooms continue to provide enriching learning experiences for the children, facilitated by a dedicated and cohesive team of educators. Additionally, our educators have undergone additional training in utilising the Playground app by Xplore, enhancing our ability to communicate effectively with families in our community.

We extend our heartfelt thanks to the educators, volunteers, and the office team for their unwavering dedication to the children and families of Bowen Street Community Centre. Your commitment has been instrumental in making this year a resounding success.



## **Treasurer's Report & Financial Statements**

The financial statements have been reviewed by Lionel Robert Arnold of J L Collyer & Partners, and in his opinion they present a true and fair view of the financial position of the Bowen Street Community Centre (BSCC) as at 30th June 2023, and of its performance for the year.

BSCC has recorded a surplus of \$30,460 for the year ended 30th June 2023 compared to a loss of \$12,945 from the previous year.


The total income was \$496,490 for the year, which was an increase of \$100,550 compared to the previous year. The total expenditure for the year was \$466,030, which was an increase of \$57,145 on the previous year.




The increase in income was mainly due to higher Childcare fees and an increase in Rental income, as well as an increase in Grants and Class fees.

The main increase in expenditure compared to the previous financial year was in Wages (including WorkCover), this increase was offset in part by lower costs in Advertising and Promotion, Equipment and Materials, and Telephone expenses.

The main income sources for BSCC in the year ended 30th June 2023 were Childcare fees and Grants. The largest expense was Payroll, which includes Wages and WorkCover expenses.





BSCC's total assets increased by \$39,951 in this financial year along with an increase of \$9,491 in total liabilities.

BSCC's financial position is sound, with an equity of \$257,378 at 30th June 2023.

## **Human Resources Report**

#### Resignation

Whilst there has been one resignation of Audette Domanski, who has dedicated many years to the Centre, we have been fortunate in having our existing educator Mellissa Burrows replacing her as the Childcare Coordinator.

#### Other information

Bowen Street Community Centre has supported 6 students this year studying early childhood education.

Staff records are in the process of being converted to a digital format.

An audit of staff files has been conducted to ensure that:

- All staff have completed mandatory requirements such as CPR, Emergency Life Support, First Aid, Mandatory Reporting and COVID. (Those due to attend these this year were prompted, and education provided, as necessary.)
- All police checks and Working with Children checks were current.
- Medical information, Vision and Mission statement, Staff Handbook, Code of Conduct, and Child Safety information was signed and filed.

It is intended that this audit will be conducted at the beginning of each year to ensure documented evidence is accessible in the staff member's file or in the Centre's IT system.

#### **Performance Appraisals**

These conversations have not commenced due to delay in surveying Centre users.

Staff are encouraged to have open communication with each other and the Manager. If required a member of the Board can assist with difficult conversations or individual appraisals.

We wish to thank all staff for their commitment and dedication to the Centre and the children they work with. Thank you to Mary Liston, Centre Manager for her creative ideas and endless enthusiasm and for this year reaching her 21st year at Bowen Street Community Centre.

## **Community Outreach**

We continue to work in the Neighbourhood House Victoria "Safe Seats, Safe Kids" program to provide free car restraint fitting and safety checks once a fortnight in the carpark.

We again partnered with Jobs Victoria, helping people get on the right path to employment by connecting them to services that can assist in finding a job. The Jobs Victoria advocate attends on the first Tuesday of each month.

We have had a 40-year relationship with the Camberwell Multiple Birth Association and continue to manage the twin breastfeeding pillow loan service from Bowen Street.

In May and September, we participated with the Nappy Collective, to collect donated unused nappies for families in need or crisis. This drive runs for two weeks, twice a year.

In June we partnered with a psychology student and offered 6 free art therapy workshops.

In our foyer, we have mini bins to collect for various charities, collected once filled:

- Fred Hollows Foundation, recycling reading glasses;
- Scope (supporting people with physical, intellectual and multiple disabilities to achieve their goals in life), recycling mobile phones;
- Planet Ark, recycling printer cartridges, free and accredited environmentally friendly; and
- Australian Breastfeeding Association, collecting used postage stamps.

- supporting early childhood educator students in our childcare programs
